From the Membership Director

"Master the Fundamentals"

I just read a good article in the "OnApproach" Newsletter from Avemco by the Company President Jim Lauerman titled "We Have Met the Enemy and He is Us". The article talks about how in the last 25 years accident statistics in GA have not changed much, despite new technology, new

aircraft systems (glass cockpits), regulations, new training materials, etc. His observations from reviewing accident claims, is that 25% of the claim dollars pay for losses caused by pilots not adequately executing the four fundamentals – climbs, turns, descents, and straight and level, especially at low speeds and near the runway. Another basic observation he makes is that it's not so much what pilots know or don't know that gets them in trouble, but what they care about. The article continues on about

the "care about" part, in which he states "The culture change we need is to bring about a more professional attitude to everything we do in flying".

If you recall the February newsletter article I shared the Angel Flight West's "Safety Above All Else" newsletter that emphasized

professionalism and the eight deadly flying sins. (side note: you can look up past newsletters on our web page – go to the site index page under newsletters archives)

I think we do a great job as a club of keeping maintenance and safety in the forefront as a way of preventing accidents. In the 12 years I have been in the club I cannot recall any in-flight accidents or incidents. We have only had a few minor accidents; all of which were ground accidents involving some ruffled feathers or prop strikes.

However, there is always room for improvement at mastering the fundamentals. As winter nears, with probably fewer X-C trips, we can take some time to work on improving our knowledge and skills. It might be a good time to dig out the POH for the birds you fly for a good review. And don't forget the PTS booklet. It's always a good source for ideas when we're looking for something to brush up on. Go out and do some maneuvers you are a little rusty at or haven't done since your private pilot certificate. Grab an instructor for some help and/or feedback. Maybe think about going after that instrument rating, or tail wheel endorsement, or try the new wings program. Come and do some "Hanger Flying" if you haven't been to a club function for a while. As the mantra of Flight Training Magazine goes – a good pilot is always learning. I believe we have a lot of good pilots in our club. Keep up the good work.

Answers concerning our Club, Policies, or even locating a **New Member Application Form** for your friend or family member can be found on the T-Craft website: www.t-craft.org.

T-Craft Business Cards and Pamphlets are available. Share them with friends and acquaintances in the community who may be looking for piloting opportunities.

Properly sign out your aircraft, including the correct designation; for example, Local, Cross Country, Maintenance, Replacement Aircraft Search, etc. If an aircraft moves, breathes, or sneezes, it MUST be correctly documented for maintenance and billing.

Delete the remainder of any unused flight time from Schedule Master immediately after landing. Somebody may be able to use that time.

T-Craft Members are responsible for keeping their **contact information** (phone numbers, email addresses, postal address) updated in Schedule Master. To check or update your

information, login to Schedule Master, click the "User" tab at the top, then click the link that says "Click here to edit your user info".
